MAMA NGINA FACE LIFT: The Sh460 million Mama Ngina Waterfront Park facelift project is now 82 per cent complete, ahead of Mashujaa fete. Construction of the Sh460 million Mombasa waterfront project is progressing on schedule with a completion date set for July this year. ICT and Innovation Principal Secretary, Mr. Jerome Ochieng said the provision of reliable and high-quality internet was critical for the project, which is expected to add to visitor experience to the

Port City of Mombasa.

"We intend to provide a conducive technology infrastructure that will enhance communication and visitor experience through sharing of photos and videos while enjoying the beautiful sceneries of the Indian Ocean," he said.

He said that with high-quality internet connectivity, the project will provide an ideal platform for the establishment of innovation hubs, cybercafés and also help youth to develop their talents.

Tourism and Wildlife Cabinet Secretary (CS), Mr. Najib Balala recently conducted the Parliamentary Committee on Sports, Culture, and Tourism where

they gave a thumbs up on the progress of the ongoing works.

The modern waterfront project was scheduled to be completed by end June but it had to be redesigned to include the building of the presidential square leading to the delays. The project being constructed by Suhufi Agencies Ltd on a 26-acre land, is envisaged to spur a 24-hour economy as it will have a 1000-seat amphitheater, a cultural center, five pigeon tower, open air fresco restaurants and cafes, fun park and water sports among other features.

The project design also shows that a new jetty for water taxis and living boat museum will also be constructed near the Likoni channel crossing. The CS said that the government will enter into a Private Public Partnership (PPP) to ensure that the park is maintained to high standards.

Balala noted that the ministry's Principal Secretary Joe Okudo will tour the project twice every week to monitor the progress of the construction and added that after the celebrations, traders who were displaced from the area will be given the first priority when it comes to modern stalls allocation.

The country's President, Uhuru Kenyatta, who

commissioned the project in January expressed his satisfaction with the transformation of the grounds saying the project will restore the glory of Mombasa town as a leading tourist destination.

Mombasa will be the fifth county to host national celebrations traditionally held in the capital, Nairobi. Other celebrations have been held in Kakamega, Nakuru, Machakos and Narok.

Mama Ngina Waterfront Park, which has benefited from the big chunk of Sh460 million, holds the rich history of Mombasa town that dates back to the 15th century.

Among the features the project aims to establish are leisure walks, souvenir shopping, entertainment, sporting and other leisure activities, foods and beverages, and relaxation areas.

It will also include Little Theatre, a cultural heritage centre, to provide a platform for exhibition of the coast's diverse cultural practices and foster heritage.

The 26-acre land is only famed for being a place where tourists, both local and international, can relax and watch the world-class ships passing by as they arrive and leave the port of Mombasa.

In a speech delivered by African Union Commission Chairperson Moussa Faki at the opening ceremony of the Seventh Tokyo International Conference on African Development (TICAD 7), African states advanced that the Public Private Partnerships (PPP) model of development was the most ideal approach of achieving sustainable development on the continent.

Mr Faki assured that through PPP's, African enterprises with the support of Japanese investments will be able to fully exploit the resource potential of the continent for the benefit of all Africans.

He said this aspiration was demonstrated by the strong private sector representation and participation in the TICAD 6 conference held in Nairobi, Kenya in 2016.

"It is urgent to promote these strategies and Africa to take advantage of the situation and to take into account the SMEs and the SMIs of Africa and to make sure that we give great attention in order to improve the business climate within its member states," Mr Faki said.

TICAD 7 which kicked off today in the Japanese port city of Yokohama south of Tokyo, is being attended by over 30 African Heads of State and Governments among them President Uhuru Kenyatta of Kenya.

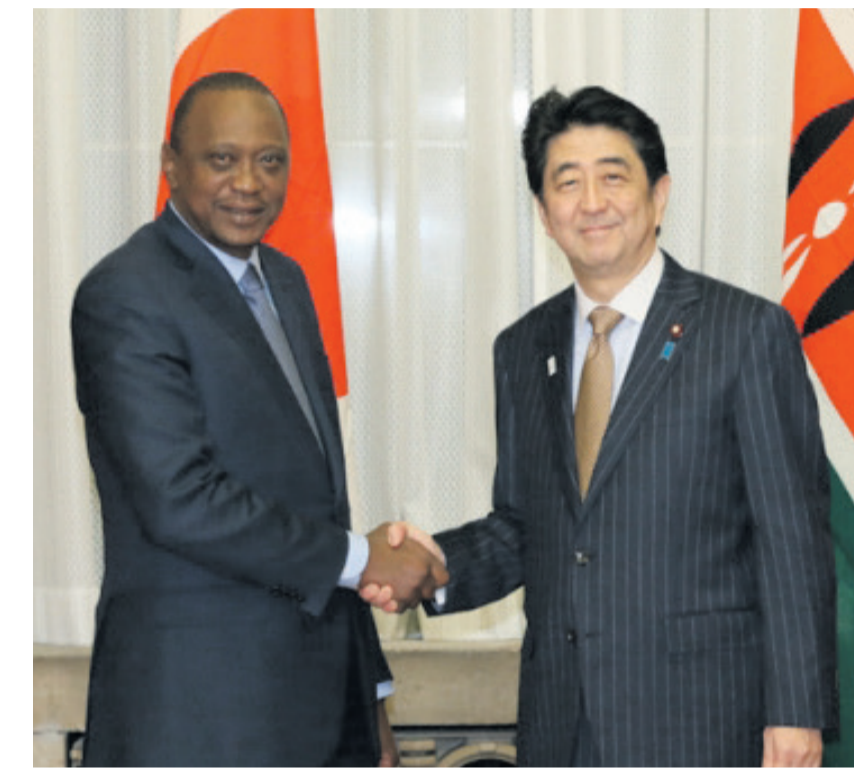

He said this aspiration was demonstrated by the strong private sector representation and participation in the TICAD 6 conference held in Nairobi, Kenya in 2016. "It is urgent to promote these strategies and Africa to take advantage of the situation and to take into account the SMEs and the SMLs of Africa and to make sure that we give great attention in order to improve the business climate within its member states," Mr Faki said. TICAD 7 which kicked off today in the Japanese port city of Yokohama south of Tokyo, is being attended by over 30 African Heads of State and Governments among them President Uhuru Kenyatta of Kenya.

Speaking on behalf of the World Bank Group, the Chief Executive Officer of the International Finance Corporation, Philippe Le Houérou reiterated Africa's position saying the future of African economies will largely be shaped by the performance of the continent's private sector. "We need the private sector to seize more of the brighter opportunity than the possible risk to do business in Africa. Together, the public and the private sector can literally ignite the continent's economy," Mr Le Houérou said. On his part, United Nations Secretary General Antonio Guterres urged TICAD member states to tap more into the growing youth population in Africa by enhancing development through innovative solutions. The UN Secretary General said technology and innovation are central to unleashing Africa's vast potential and realizing the UN's shared vision of leaving no one behind. During his opening remarks, Japan Prime Minister Shinzo Abe announced a new initiative by the Japanese Government that seeks to strengthen judicial and law enforcement systems of African nations. The programme dubbed New Approach for Peace and Stability in Africa (NAPSA) has already admitted 6,076 police officers, public prosecutors and judges from 39 African into a capacity building initiative where they will be trained on criminal justice and crime prevention. "NAPSA will assist in making judicial, governmental administration and legislative systems stable and secure so that nation building doesn't move backward," PM Abe said. Prime Minister Abe further announced a pledge by his government to support the roll out of Universal Health Care programmes in Africa saying the initiative will benefit over three million recipients on the continent. Through TICAD, PM Abe said Japan had invested over 20 billion dollars in Africa in the last 3 years. President Kenyatta is accompanied by Cabinet Secretaries Monica Juma (Foreign Affairs), Ukur Yatani (National Treasury), Sicily Kariuki (Health), Prof George Magoha (Education) and James Macharia (Transport).

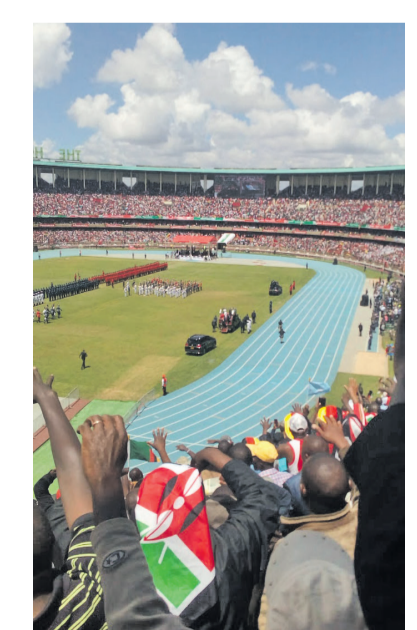

Government keen on harnessing sporting talents from the grassroots

President Uhuru Kenyatta has today assured the country that his administration is keen on harnessing and nurturing sporting talents among young Kenyans. He said mechanisms are being put in place to ensure that talents are identified and developed right from the grassroots to benefit gifted young people. "We do not just want to cultivate talents at the national but also at the grassroots level," the President said. He said the Competence Based Curriculum being rolled out is structured to facilitate the identification and development of talented young people at an early age. The President spoke today at State House, Nairobi when he flagged off the 2019 Chungju World Martial Arts Mastership in South Korea. Tong-Il Moo-Do is a unique Korean martial arts sport. President Kenyatta was presented with the 8th degree honorary Black Belt award from the World Tong-Il Moo-Do Federation in appreciation of his continuous support and commitment to the sport. The award was given to the President by the Chairman of the Kenya Tong-Il Moo-Do Federation Clarence Mwakio Ing'ala. At the same event, the President received the national flag and trophies from the national men's basketball team, the Morans, and the national women's volleyball team, Malkia Strikers. The two teams recently competed in the FIBA AfroCan basketball tournament in Bamako, Mali and the Africa Women Volleyball Championship in Cairo, Egypt respectively. The President reassured the country that the government has allocated adequate funds to cater for the welfare of teams representing the country at international tournaments. "We have now set aside funds to ensure that no team carrying our national flag will sleep in airports because they lack tickets, accommodation or they have no allowance," he said. He asked sports associations to ensure that money allocated to the teams is used for intended purposes, adding that mismanagement of the funds will not be tolerated. "When we give you money, you must account for how it has been used to benefit our sports men and women. We want each federation and association to show how the money has been used to support respective players," the President cautioned. "We must make sure that our federations support our athletes and develop sports. Never again will we allow the money to be misused. Lets support our teams so that we can restore the dignity to our young men and women who are making us proud as a nation," he added. The President commended the national basketball and volleyball teams for their sterling performance in the recent championships, saying they have put Kenya on the global map in sports that it was not traditionally known for. "Kenya is today known not just for athletics. We have our basket ballers, netballers, swimmers and others representing us. We are now excelling in different arenas and not just in what we were traditionally known for," President Kenyatta said. For the teams heading out of the country for continental and international tournaments, the President urged them to do their best by maintaining discipline. "Play fair and clean. If you come back a champion we will be happy but we will be happier if you come home champions after playing fair and clean," he advised. Sports CS Amina Mohamed said Kenya's sports men and women are the country's foremost ambassadors as they continue to raise the national flag high at international platforms. The CS commended the national beach volleyball team for winning a silver medal at the ongoing 12th African Games in Morocco yesterday. The sports men and women were accompanied to State House by Sports PS Kirimi Kaberia and Athletics Kenya President Lt. Gen (Rtd) Jackson Tuwei.

Synergy in the War Against Corruption

WAR ON CORRUPTRION:

The largest chunk of responsibility in the war against corruption lies on the Executive arm of government. Political goodwill is crucial if any significant steps are to be made in the anti-graft campaign

If there is a subject that has divided Kenyans as much as it has united them, it is corruption. Corruption has become a national talking point and figuratively turned Kenya into the modern day version of the Biblical Tower of Babel. It is a phenomenon that has left leaders in the socio-economic and political spheres 'speaking in tongues'.

One thing has nonetheless remained constant all through - the President's expression of his wish and desire to completely rid the nation of corruption. The President has floated a slew of possible approaches to the war against graft including Lifestyle Audits as the silver bullet with which we could shoot corruption from our nation.

The philosophy behind the decision to subject all public officers to a lifestyle audit was to put them to task to account for their wealth. You will all recall the hullabaloo and politicization that this proposal elicited. In the end, this noble initiative, which had been hailed by Kenyans as a move in the right direction, was quietly shelved.

Finally, there is a glimmer of hope that we could after all start to tackle the corruption dragon. This ray of hope is evident in the level of zeal, dedication and commitment with which the Director of Public Prosecution (DPP) and the Director of Criminal Investigation (DCI) are taking their responsibilities. For the first time in the history of independent Kenya, the nation has been treated to the now infamous 'Friday arrests'. These arrests have been target to everyone including those seen as influential in business, social, and political positions.

The DPP and the DCI have been seen to be unflinching in their resolve to bring the corrupt to book. This has not been without murmurs of discontent and disapproval. However, so far we have not seen a single conviction by a court of law. This is what brings me to the crux of my argument. The President has, numerous times, declared his unreserved support for the war against graft.

He has at the same time been sincere enough to express his frustrations in his cause. You'll remember the one time when the President interrupted his address and asked the nation what it was that people wanted him to do on the war against the corruption menace.

To many, he, at that time, gave the impression of a leader who was conceding defeat in an epic war. Few accurately decoded the President's message. He was pointing a finger at the wanting level of synergy among the institutions that are instrumental in the investigation, profiling and prosecution of corruption cases.

It is sad that the discord among the institutions that should be spearheading the anti-graft purge has persisted to date. The Judiciary, the offices of the DPP and

the DCI have up to very recently been caught up in difference of opinion with regard to the best approach that the war against corruption ought to assume. This is as sad as it is disheartening. For the war on corruption to be won, there is urgent need for the adoption of concerted

of blame game that the heads of the key government organizations mandated to fight graft including the ODP, EACC, Judiciary, etc have been feeding the nation on must urgently come to an end. The onslaught against corruption must at the same time be anchored upon objectivity and should never be used to achieve political ends.

Over and above all, there is need for educational curriculum developers and implementers to secure the place of national values, ethics and integrity as crucial life skills that learners need to be equipped with early in life. And this should be incorporated in all curricula from an early stage. As a country we need a cultural mind shift and where better to start with our young minds to inculcate zero tolerance to corruption.

This aside, those who are implicated in cases of corruption and consequently found guilty, should be severely dealt with within the confines of the law. Conversely, forthright citizens need to be rewarded. It is in this spirit that the President recently touted a matatu conductor as a paragon of honesty and subsequently decorated him with a befitting presidential award after he picked a wallet loaded with cash of unknown value and out of honesty, beat everyone's expectations by tracking the owner of the wallet and handing over the cash to him.

Even though the Chief Justice has refuted claims of corruption within the Judiciary, there is no better way to sustain public confidence in the Judiciary than the initiation of a complete shift of paradigm in the way and manner in which graft cases are handled.

Political goodwill is crucial if any significant steps are to be made in the anti-graft campaign. The President has led the way and all the other public servants must follow suit. In fact, the President should not budge in his crusade against corruption. The kind

Even more important than any other proposal I have so far raised, is the need for accountability and integrity across all spheres of public and private life. Any rumor of lack of integrity and lack of accountability among the public servants and private citizens should be taken seriously and addressed before it becomes the proverbial elephant in the house.

Besides, there is need to leverage on the monumental gains we have made in Information Communication and Technology and employ the same in the anti-graft war. Inventions such as the Integrated Financial Management Information System (IFMIS) are laudable and should give rise to better technological tools that can be used in the fight against corruption.

The place of the church and the general citizenry in the anti-graft campaign cannot be understated. The church should reboot and regain its voice in the condemnation of such vices as corruption. The citizenry must, for their part, remain vigilant and call out the corrupt without any fears of reprisals. This, in my view, is the surest way to end corruption in our Motherland, Kenya.

Kakamega set to open Western Kenya's first eco-friendly chemical waste disposal plant

Kakamega has constructions underway for Western Kenya's first eco-friendly chemical waste disposal plant to be located at the Kakamega County General Hospital.

The Governor of Kakamega Wycliffe Oparanya revealed that Kakamega County will be taking in chemical waste for proper disposal from the hospitals in Western Kenya and the Western Kenya environments.

his government has invested Sh12M in construction of the facility which he said will be eco-friendly. Chemical incineration, he said, will be a historic move both in public and private health facilities across Kakamega County. The modern equipment will not destroy waste by combustion, polluting the environment, but will instead physically shred the materials using microfilters," stated Kakamega county government press statement.

The Kakamega county government intends to use the modern chemical waste plant facility to be another source of revenue generation for the county government of Kakamega besides managing health wastes economically.

The county Government of Kakamega stated that the eco-friendly chemical waste disposal plant is very new and serves as a history made in Kenya.

The chemical waste management facility will be used to serve the health waste producing facilities courtesy of partnership between Kakamega county government and Belgium.

The eco-friendly disposal plant is set to start working in two months' time from August.

So far the construction of the chemical waste management plant is almost complete and after official commissioning at a date to be announced will be serving Western Kenya region.

Writers and Publishers Should Help Awaken our National Consciousness

Someone wants Kwani? Trust, a regional publisher and distributor of contemporary literature founded in the year 2003 by towering contemporary Kenyan writer Binyavanga Wainaina, probed. Reason? He feels that the texts published by the trust give a distorted and sloppy account of the Kenyan national history. With a rare confidence and liberal flow of thought that is typical of a shrewd literature practitioner, writer and Kenyatta University Literature don Abeneza Ndago, in his article published in AfricanWriter.com on September 19th, 2016 argues the Trust of using Literature as a vehicle for transporting communal stereotypes, gossips and myths with a view to place a single African community above the rest in the national sphere. He sounds convinced that Binyavanga is a protégé of pioneer Kenyan African writer Professor Ngugi Wa Thiongo and has consciously or otherwise bought the half truth attributing the struggle for our independence from the yoke of colonialism solely to the efforts of the Mau Mau that features prominently in his writings. He reminds his audience of the old view of many critics that Mau Mau movement is so dear a subject to Ngugi that without it, Ngugi the prolific writer would be non-existent. He however finds it fallacious for Ngugi to restrict the attainment of Kenya's independence to the sacrifices made and the prices paid by the Mau Mau members. It's a national lie, he points out, to decimate the contributions of the trade unionists, the civil society and the Asian and European moderates. The long and short of his argument? Our high level of ethnic bigotry as a nation,

might be a clear reflection of how badly Kenyan Literature talks about national coexistence. Whether or not his allegations about Kwani? Trust are true or false remains open debate and investigations by the concerned parties. Nonetheless, the issues raised in the article call for urgent and deep reflections. Reading him, the foundation of his anger, bitterness and anger in his toe was never lost on me. He had certainly expected Kwani? Trust to do things differently, to completely break links with the old fashion of packaging our literature. We have to affirm the writer's appreciation of the intimate relationship between art and the society. Writers and publishers, more than anybody else, are aware of the emotional impact of literature on readers or audience. This is why speculations that a publisher uses writing workshops within and without Nairobi to tune budding writers to consistently depict certain Kenyan communities in a certain light in their writing should raise eyebrows within the circles of literature enthusiasts. Literature should not hurt the national cohesion crusade. Instead, it should be used to awaken the national consciousness among our countrymen. Apart from America which Abeneza repeatedly points at, obviously by its virtue being the motherland of Kwani? Trust donors, as an example of how literature can help a country achieve true statehood or nationhood, Canada is another relevant case. Canadian authors like Margaret Atwood, author of The Edible Woman and Hugh Macleenan, author of Barometer Rising among others hugely contributed

to the birth of the Canadian national consciousness. The contemporary Kenyan writer should interact with the works of penmen of Ngugi's generation not at all with a view to copy their writing style but to interrogate their presentation of our national history. The modern writers ought to make it their endeavour to model their works in a way that would help cool the political animosities and bickering whose root cause is the communal myths and stereotypes. The kind of literature that belongs to our age is that which reminds us how we can turn diversity into strength. With their pens, the writers of this century should shoot down all lies that are told with the intention of putting any community on a socio-political and economic pedestal at the expense of the rest. For to do this is to breed hatred and intolerance. Given the prevailing cut-throat competition in the publishing world, it would be fair if we allowed publishers a free hand to tailor and package their publications as they dim fit. However, they should propagate nothing less than the production of literature that enhances integration and cohesion. And when all is said and done, Abeneza's sentiments certainly point at the need for financiers of literary ventures from within and without the country to closely monitor how their benefactors use literature to foster unity and peaceful coexistence. Something has to be done, not based on Kwani? Trust's guilt or innocence but with the possibility of a ripple effect of the charges leveled against the trust in mind.

It is Fallacy to Restrict Literary Discourse to Literature Graduates



Recently, with dismay and disbelief, I followed a social media space literary spat. Just after a teacher who is a good friend had uploaded pictures that captured the moments he had shared with other attendees of a literary event he had organized in their school, a 'literature guru' showed up to put my friend in his place. You see, my friend is a teacher whose forte is Geography and Religion. This is what certainly inspired the 'Literature guru' in question to audaciously point out that my friend was misplaced. That he didn't belong to the literary congregation and should have instead sought the company of fellow men of cloth. Laughable, isn't it? He seemed not to care any bit about the number of books my friend has authored, let alone the uncountable literary opinions that have been published in the leading local dailies under his name. I understood the guru quite well. He is one of the subscribers to the school of thought that limits true literary

more vastly read than some Literature graduates. This is the reason Literature graduates should not bestow upon themselves absolute literary authority that in the end even tries to stifle other voices from without the literary lecture halls. Let the ideologies, theories and the validity of arguments advanced by individuals be the fulcrums of literary discourse. Anyone who feels the urge to try their hand at writing or authorship should go ahead without any hesitation whether or not they ever sat in a Literature class at the university notwithstanding. All the ferocious readers should write and share the reviews of the books they have read so as to whet the appetite of other book lovers. Organizers of literary events should continue leaving the doors to their events ajar for all literary enthusiasts as they have been doing. And even though PEN Kenya upcountry literary events have always been used to counter the pleas for the devolution and delocalization of such events, a lot more still needs to be done. There is need for literary events to be held in all corners in the country. Perhaps the financial input of both the national and county governments, we could have big county literary events across the country. This would undoubtedly help revive the dying reading culture and even turn leisure reading into a national value. Let us all unite in our appreciation of Literature. Let us read and then write our own stories since as the shrewd literary practitioners opine, one doesn't need a university degree to be either a ferocious reader or a great writer. And my friend must not let the cynics and pessimists kill his literary enthusiasm.

The Splendors of Shimoni Archipelago's Eco-Systems

Shimoni is best known for its dark history as a slave port. Situated 80 kilometres south of Mombasa, Shimoni is now the main gateway to Wasini Island (which can be seen from the jetty at Shimoni) and the Kisite Marine National Park. The caves at Shimoni were once used to hold slaves, and are said to extend ten's of kilometres deep into the earth. A visit to the caves make for an interesting yet eerie, and sobering visit. Shimoni also has some old Swahili ruins.



When the members of Clean Mombasa CBO revisited Wasini Island in a recent past, some of them did not know that the island they were visiting was part of the now famous Shimoni Archipelago, consisting of three more islands, forming what holidaymakers popularly call: "the splendours and attractions of Shimoni Archipelago". During the visit, the members of Clean Mombasa CBO, having travelled from Mombasa through Ukunda to Shimoni, were impressed by the local teams of operators and owners of transfer and excursion boats at the entrance of Shimoni Port jetty, ready to discuss visitors' itineraries to Wasini, Mupunguti and Kisite islands. While the chairman and two other CBO's members were negotiating boat hire costs with the boat operators, the visiting groups were curiously observing the entrance to the historical "slave caves", where between 1600s and 1800s, slaves captured upcountry and coast region, were kept before being taken to Zanzibar for onwards hardship transportation to unknown lands in the Americas and Asia. The members of Clean Mombasa CBO on an excursion visit to learn and acquire knowledge on the Shimoni Archipelago's fascinating eco-systems, had one common objective: observe the mangrove trees at closer look, in order to effectively protect the mangrove tree bushes and forests available in Mombasa County and beyond. The visiting members of Clean Mombasa CBO, were excited when the boat operator (captain) sailed around Wasini Island reaching Mupunguti and Kisite islands. While sailing through the channel separating Mupunguti and Kisite atolls, the CBO's members observed the beautiful scenes on the horizons above the two Marine National Parks. On the far side from Kisite atolls, Pemba Island in Tanzania could be seen. Another fascinating attraction was the atoll next to the main Kisite Island. On this casi-submerged coral atoll, many vessels

and boats were seen docked around it and many young people swimming and filming the atoll surroundings. These were magical scenes not seen before by some of the CBO's members. Clean Mombasa CBO's excursionists, were received cheerfully at the disembarking point on Wasini Island by the owner of seafood's restaurant where they had a very delicious lunch, before visiting the Wasini Island Women Group CBO. The CBO's members were provided with brief information on the Wasini Island Women CBO, and thereafter, they were taken to watch mangrove trees, using what they called "board walk", an elevated timber built bridge, which allowed visitors to study mangrove trees, at closer range even during the high tides of the Indian Ocean. The members of Clean Mombasa CBO, left Shimoni Archipelago satisfied for having observed the entrance of Slave Trade Caves and visited the Shimoni Archipelago eco-systems, an important aspect of domestic tourism. Unite and work together for faster development, President Kenyatta tells Coast leaders

MOMBASA COUNTY, 6TH SEPTEMBER 2019, (PSCU)

President Uhuru Kenyatta has challenged Coast leaders to unite and work closely with each other so as to achieve faster development in the region.

The President advised the leaders to have a broader and more long-term view of development saying the focus should be on projects that benefit more people through wealth and employment creation.

The President who spoke at State House, Mombasa when he hosted elected leaders from the region told the leaders to always put the interests of wananchi ahead of all other partisan considerations.

"Let us find solutions to our challenges, there can be nothing which is impossible if we unite," President Kenyatta told the leaders who included all Governors from the 6 coastal counties of Mombasa, Kilifi, Lamu, Taita Taveta, Kwale and Tana River.

The President said time had come for leaders to think of how they would like to be remembered by current and future generations.

"We must look at our history as a country and as a region, and ask ourselves can our people as Kenyans continue to sustain politics of division, politics of hate, politics of backstabbing and still believe that we are going to be a middle income country by 2030? Is it possible?" President Kenyatta posed.

The Head of State cautioned the leaders against divisive politics saying leadership is a God given opportunity to serve all Kenyans



irrespective of their stations in life.

On development, the President outlined the various mega projects being implemented by his administration in the region adding that the government will ensure all ongoing roads, water and other infrastructure developments are completed.

He said the projects such as the various roads, the Dongo Kundu SEZ and the Port of Lamu are aimed at opening up the region to more investments.

President Kenyatta reiterated that the handshake between him and former Prime Minister Raila Odinga was aimed at uniting

all Kenyans so as to take the country's development agenda a notch higher.

"The essence of the handshake is not about who shall be where and who shall have what position but how can we as Kenyans together not live in the past but learn from it," the President told the leaders.

"We need not plan for today but live in it and plan for the future because that is what we can give as a gift to this country," said the President.

All the leaders who spoke at the consultative meeting among them Governors Ali Hassan Joho (Mombasa), Salim Mvurya (Kwale), Amason Kingi (Kilifi), Dhadho Godhana (Tana River), Fahim Twaha (Lamu) and Granton Samboja (Taita Taveta) said they supported the President's development agenda as espoused in the Big 4 blueprint.

The Coast political leaders thanked the President for the various development projects implemented by the government saying the transformative interventions are changing the economic fortunes of the region. Dental Health: Oral Hygiene Care and Maintenance



What is Oral Hygiene?

Oral hygiene (OH) includes all the processes for keeping your mouth clean and healthy. Good OH is necessary for prevention of dental decay, gum diseases, bad breath and other dental problems.

How do we maintain good OH?

Healthy teeth not only enable you to look and feel good, they make it possible to eat, speak and socialize well with other people.

There are various methods required to maintain good OH.

1. Brushing your teeth at least twice a day or preferably after every meal.
2. Flossing your teeth regularly
3. Eating a healthy diet
4. Use of other interdental cleaning aids.
5. Regular dental checkups.

Proper brushing technique

1. Hold the toothbrush at a 45 degree angle at the gum line and sweep or roll the brush away from the gum line.
2. Gently brush on all the visible surfaces of the teeth that is the outer, inner and the chewing surfaces of the tooth.
3. Give extra attention to the gum line and hard to reach back molars.
4. Do not brush too hard as this can cause gum recession and wear of the outer surfaces of the teeth.
5. Gently brush on the tongue to remove debris.
6. Change your toothbrush after every 3 months or once you notice the bristles are flaring out.

Flossing

Flossing removes plaque from between your teeth that brushing misses out. Dental floss are either supplied in a reel or as flossettes. Flossettes are much easier to use as the floss is attached to a holder for convenience.

How do you floss?

1. Wrap approximately 20 cm of around your middle finger.
2. Guide the floss in between the teeth and gently follow the curves of the teeth.
3. Ensure to floss beneath the gum line using a back and forth, up and down motion but avoid snapping the floss on the gums.

Other additional oral hygiene aids include use of tongue scrappers, interdental brushes and mouth rinses.

Good oral health is important to your overall well-being. The teeth should be free of debris, the gums should appear pink and not hurt or bleed when brushing or flossing.

Climax of Climate Change!

Climate Change, according to environmental conservationists, can be defined as changes in weather patterns over a region or continent, with variations characterized by extreme weather changes. Furthermore, weather changes form a process known as "radiative forcing", resulting from human influences (activities), particularly the burning of "fossil fuels; oil, gas and coal.

The largest contributors to Climate Change are both human activities and natural occurrences such as volcanic eruptions, tsunamis, earthquakes, tropical cyclones, and other natural sources. These human/natural occurrences form what are known as Greenhouse gases (GHGs), resulting from the concentration of carbon oxide (CO₂), methane (CH₄), and Nitrous oxide (NO₂) in the atmosphere.

The concentration of CO₂, CH₄ and

NO₂ in the lower atmosphere known as "Troposphere, forming GHGs, move to the upper Stratosphere level. In the Stratosphere, Greenhouse Gases concentration affects the "Ozone Layer", the blanket which naturally protects living organisms (man, animal, insect, plant etc) from ultra violet radiation from the sun. Today, under the effects of Climate Change, we can assume that the hole created by GHGs on Ozone Layer is becoming larger and, therefore the Sun's

the advent of industrial revolution in the 1800s, in Europe and North America.

Kenya, as a nation and active member of the United Nations, is a signatory to the 2016 Paris Agreement on Climate Change, which calls on States to ensure reduction of GHGs emissions into the atmosphere and retain the level of global average temperature below 20°C.

After the 2016 Paris Agreement on Climate Change, increasing numbers of environmentalists and State institutions are urging citizens of their countries to make sure they plant trees and protect forests, institute strong waste management policy measures, especially in large towns. Mombasa City comes into focus here, particularly in waste collection and proper waste disposal.

Tourism as a human activity contributes heavily to the formation of the Greenhouse gases, the largest Ozone layer damaging factor, because of its strong components-land, air, sea transport means; carrying travellers, goods, equipment, machines and all kinds of minerals. Who Knew?
Massage can be as powerful as morphine for those in pain. Saying "ouch" a lot? Book a massage. It feels good, of course, but it's also an effective treatment, according to a recent study of 605 people. Those who got a daily 20 - minute massage (in addition to medication) after surgery reported less pain a day earlier than those who just got drugs, or who got drugs plus 20 minutes of one-on-one conversation.

Other Benefits of Massage:

Different ways that cybercriminals use to get you?

Cybercrime is any criminal activity carried out using computers or the internet. Cybercrime uses tools like phishing, viruses, spyware, ransomware, and social engineering to break the law.

You probably already know that phishing is the fraudulent act of acquiring private and sensitive information, such as credit card numbers, personal identification, account usernames, and passwords by using a complex set of social engineering techniques. The idea behind phishing is simple: to get you to click on a bogus link in an attempt to acquire sensitive information or access to systems. According to numerous studies done, phishing attacks apparently work nearly half of the time. "But I'd never click on a link without knowing where it came from!" I can hear you say in indignation. Remember that attackers anticipate this resistance and have been busy creating an attack that you will fall for. So what are the many different ways that cybercriminals use to get you?

1. Deceptive phishing

This is your basic phishing attack. Fraudsters impersonate a legitimate company and attempt to steal the members of your organization's personal information or login credentials. They use threats and a sense of urgency to scare their victims into making a big mistake. For example, you may get a spoofed email from your bank claiming there's a problem with your bank balance. They will then require you to give them your login details so they can fix it. Unfortunately, when you do so, they will use the data you have so willingly given to withdraw cash from your bank. Now there really will be a problem with your bank balance. The success often hinges on how close the attack email resembles the legitimate company's correspondence. As is ever the case, the devil is in the details. From generic salutations, grammar mistakes to spelling errors, these should set off red flags the size of Aladdin's carpet.



2. Spear phishing

Here, it gets personal. See, you wouldn't trust emails from just anyone, but there's probably a particular person who says "Jump" and you oblige before he/she tells you how high. This attack, therefore, relies on that bond and exploits it by harvesting information about your peers or superiors. The attackers then customize the email to maximize their chances of success. This is especially popular on LinkedIn, where attackers wield multiple sources of information in order to create a targeted attack email. It's like pretending to be your child's parent in order to steal their candy.

3. Whaling attack

This attack is named so probably because the attackers are aiming for the big fish or perhaps the targets are usually left blubbering a successful attack. It mainly targets CEOs and other key decision-makers such as yourself. If successful, details acquired can be used to wreak havoc within the company through what is referred to as a business email compromise. When it rains, it pours. The success rate of this type of attack is high because CEOs don't usually participate in security awareness training. This should change as ever the faithful General leads his/her troops. More importantly, the ability to authorize financial transactions via email should be mitigated or entirely nullified.

Kenya is now an oil exporting country



MOMBASA, 26 AUGUST 2019, (PSCU)

Kenya's dream to join the league of petroleum exporting countries became a reality today as the first consignment of Kenyan crude oil left the Port of Mombasa today. The consignment of 200,000 barrels of low sulphur crude from Kenya's oil fields in Turkana County, bought by United Kingdom based ChemChina UK, is worth Shs1.2 billion, a price much higher than what was initially projected. Kenya is using this initial export to test the global market before it embarks on large scale commercial production of its oil.

The inaugural shipment of the crude oil makes Kenya the first country in the region to become an oil exporting nation. The Celsius Riga, the ship carrying the Kenyan crude oil left the Mombasa Port for Malaysia shortly after midday, after it was flagged off by President Uhuru Kenyatta. President

Kenyatta said it was a milestone moment for Kenya as it becomes the first country in the region to become an oil exporter.

The President said the government is committed to achieve sustainable development through prudent use of the country's resources. "We will ensure that Kenya's natural resources are utilized in a manner that yields maximum dividends today but without compromising the interests of future generations," said the President. Kenya's Early Oil Pilot Scheme (EOPS) commenced in June 2018 marking the beginning of the journey towards full development of Kenya's oil and gas resources.

The President said that the next phase following the success of the pilot project will include full field development that will be characterized by production and pipeline transportation of crude from Lokichar to the new Port of Lamu.

President Kenyatta said the oil project has already brought benefits for the people of Turkana County, with the local communities directly

benefiting from employment opportunities in production and logistics, in addition to provision of ancillary and support services.

President Kenyatta said the government has put in place measures to ensure that the fruits of prosperity are shared with devolved units in an equitable and sustainable manner.

At the same event, President Kenyatta congratulated 136 Kenyans who have gained employment as seafarers on several ships owned by the Mediterranean Shipping Company (MSC).

The 136 seafarers are part of a contingent of 275 Kenyans who have so far gained employment as part of ongoing government efforts to position the blue economy sector as a key economic driver. The President revealed that the seafarers have got lucrative jobs and asked them to use their incomes wisely for the benefit of their families and their country. In addition, each seafarer will receive one return ticket for annual leave, meals and accommodation, health insurance as well as access to free world class in-house training to enable them to progress their careers. The first batch of seafarers will serve in various fields including ship rating, cruise staff, cabin stewards, cooks, secretaries, shop attendants and animators.

"I also urge you to emulate the seafarers who have been recruited before you. Because of their exemplary performance, the Mediterranean Shipping Company has steadily increased the hiring of young Kenyans to work in their ships. Serve with professionalism, dignity and integrity and build Kenya's reputation at sea," the President told the newly recruited seafarers. The seafarers were introduced by Chief of Defence Forces General Samson Mwachethe who heads a government taskforce on the blue economy.

Petroleum CS John Munyes said the Government plans to construct a pipeline between Turkana and Lamu to transport the crude oil. Governors Ali Hassan Joho (Mombasa), Fahim Twaha (Lamu), Prof John Lonyangapuo (West Pokot), Salim Mvurya (Kwale) and the Deputy Governor of Turkana County Peter Emuria also spoke at the function.

Kenya to take UHC lessons from Barbados, First Lady Margaret Kenyatta says

BRIDGETOWN, BARBADOS, 9 AUGUST 2019 (PSCU)

First Lady Margaret Kenyatta has said Kenya is keen to learn from the Barbados model of universal healthcare. She spoke after an extensive tour of the Edgar Cochrane Polyclinic, a specialist mother and baby medical facility located in downtown Bridgetown, Barbados.

During the hospital visit, the First Lady met and interacted with new mothers, most of whom had come for postnatal care, and their babies. The First Lady who was received at the facility by Barbados Health Minister Lucille Moe and her Information counterpart Dr Bany Wand was taken round the model public health facility which offers free maternal and child healthcare including dental, nutritional and counseling services to over 30,000 patients annually.

Speaking after the guided tour, the First Lady said the centre was an excellent example of how a universal health system should be set up. "I am impressed by what I have seen at this facility. The world class services given to mothers and their babies are what should comprise of a working universal health system," the First Lady said.

She said that as Kenya rolls out her universal healthcare plan, the country will take lessons from Barbados especially in the area of mother and child wellness. Started as a medical training school in 1981, the Edgar Cochrane Polyclinic has grown over the decades to become one of the largest public health facilities in the region with 8 centres spread across the country serving over 280,000 patients. The hospital serves patients from across the 15 nations that make up the Caribbean Community and Common Market (CARICOM) among them Antigua and Barbuda, The Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, Haiti and Jamaica.

Who Is Responsible For My Destiny?

Many of us believe that God writes our destiny. We need to pause and introspect on this belief. If God wrote our destiny, two things would happen: First, since we are all children of God, all our destinies would have been equal.

Second, as our parent God would have written a perfect destiny for all of us. Today our destinies are neither equal, nor perfect. We also believed the spiritual law which states - "As is my Karma, so will be my destiny." Our karmas are not always perfect and we all do not create identical karmas. So our destiny is not neither perfect nor equal.

We need to ask our self which of these two beliefs feels right for us. Karma in Sanskrit means action. Law of Karma is about action and reaction, or cause and effect. Karmic law is constantly working in our lives as Karma includes our every thought, every word and every action. As per the Law of Karma, every action - however small or significant - has a consequence.

The consequence is always fair. Right action brings a good consequence and wrong action brings a difficult one. Certain karmas may result in an immediate result.

Other karmas may have consequence coming back an hour later, a year later, 20 years later, 50 years later, or in a future lifetime.

SOW THE SEEDS OF RIGHT KARMA

Suppose a person eats 4 Ice-creams at a time instead of one. This amounts to a negative karma in terms of greed, abuse of his physical health and ignorance. So he is likely to face an immediate consequence in the form of a headache, or consequence after two days in the form of cold or flu. In this case we can map the karma with the consequence. It is easy to see the working of Law of Karma.

However when we see the effects of karma on a subtle level, we will not be able to map consequence with the karma, since the karma might have been performed years ago or even in a past birth.

We need not worry about that aspect of identifying the cause. It is enough if we remember that

- The Law of Karma is always

accurate and always fair to everyone.

- Our present situation is only a result of our past karma. So we are responsible for everything that happens to us.
- Our present karma decides our future so we have the power to create our destiny.

Whether we believe in it or not, the Law Of Karma is in action. We need not fear the law but let us be aware of it. We also need to remember that Karma includes thoughts also, not just words and actions. So let us focus on right thinking, speaking and behaving, to create a beautiful destiny.

Karma teaches me that at every step, I am the creator of my own little world, the creator of my future circumstances. I also am the creator of the environment immediately around me. On a bigger level I am a co-creator or partner, together with God, of a positive future of the world, of the world of tomorrow, of the world of peace, love and happiness.

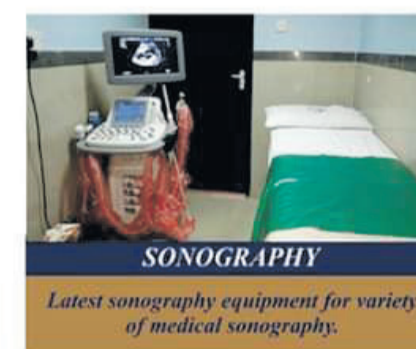
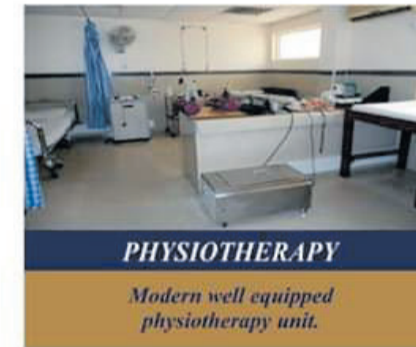

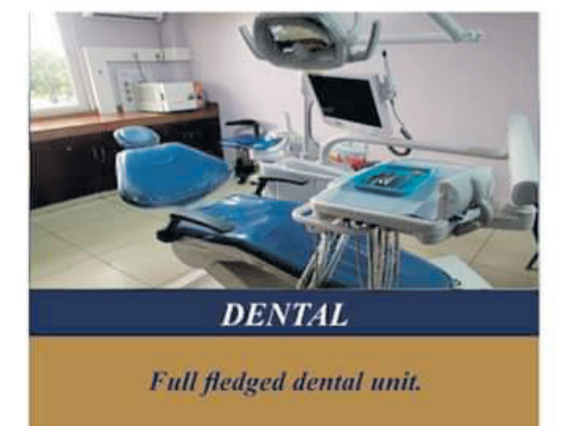
